Formation and Education - Essentials of the Great Commission

A few weeks ago, Martha and I were having a chat about what Jesus really commands us to do (I know, we have really "odd" dinner conversations). I chimed in with "well, you know, at the very end, as Jesus was preparing to ascend, he said, quite clearly and quite simply, 'Go! And make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit" (c.f. Matthew 28:19). Go. Make. Baptize: these three remain. We often call this the Great Commission. Let's talk about these three words.

Go – simple enough: move, get out, meet people where they are, don't expect them to come to you. Imagine what would have happened had those first disciples just stayed in Jerusalem or the immediate region – the Good News of Christ Jesus would have remained there and would not have set a new example for the world to follow. In other words, the Good News would have died from lack of "going". Want to be a disciple of Jesus then you have to "go" in some way.

Make – now this can be a tricky word for us as it suggests a heavy handed, forceful approach to "Go-"ing and sharing the Good News. The Greek that is used here has "disciple" as a verb. Basically, the text says "go and disciple the nations". This means that it is up to us and our actions to make others understand what it means to be a disciple. This puts a lot of pressure on us – those who publicly say that we identify as Christian. **We** have to **do** what **we say** ourselves – the old adage "do as I say not as I do" does not apply to the followers of Christ.

We have to do both. We have to disciple others: we have to set the example, so others see the way of love as we understand the love of Christ. In so doing, we make disciples only after we ourselves have been discipled.

Here, I break from our three words – go, make, baptize – to address the two words that title this essay: formation and education. At first glance, these two words may appear synonymous. The church has often seen these as interchangeable. The church has also recognized that they are different and at times focused more clearly on one over the other – to our great detriment. In many ways they are like the Doctrine of the Trinity – they stand alone as separate "persons" – each bringing a unique understanding of and action to the central intention; yet, at the same time, not being the same, but always pointing to and being a part of the unity.

Let's see if I can present this in a more helpful way: Education says 1+1 = 2. This may be seen as knowledge. Formation equips one to put that knowledge to work: to allow what I have learned to "break me, melt me, mold me, fill me".

In our Christian pilgrimage, we need both. We need the education – gaining knowledge by studying our Scriptures and Traditions. We need to learn the key tenets of our faith. But that is only half the pilgrimage: we also need to be formed based on reason. We need to put those to work in our lives – we have to be formed, and re-re-formed, daily with each day moving us closer to the likeness of Christ.

So what does formation look like? Well, to start, it looks like a personal willingness to be changed. To do this, we must be in community (so we may know what it is about ourselves that we need to change). We must share our struggles and successes as we listen to others share their struggles and successes. We must be willing to listen with new ears and see with new eyes a world in need of the healing that Jesus Christ has started and charged us with continuing. We must be willing to go out in a tide that is against the love and grace and mercy of Christ and join our voice with the voice of the Prophets, the faithful of ages past, and speak clearly the message of Christ's love today, right now, in our time, and against this world's broken tide. To do this we must be formed; to know what Christ would have us say and do we must be educated: Christian Education and Christian Formation their importance cannot be replaced or ignored.

Now we are ready to return to the final word in our set of three – baptize. This is not just the physical act of baptizing (pouring water on someone). That is too easy and quite frankly an afront to what Jesus is commanding. To baptize someone is to help them realize that they are not only a beloved child of God but also the obligations and expectations of being constantly educated and formed in the faith. Our baptism is not a rite of passage. Our baptism is not a photo opportunity. Our baptism in not a "once-and-done" event. Our baptism is a call to action in a world that is hostile to the message of hope, love, and justice that we bring. Our baptism is our joining in the eternal proclamation of the gospel of Jesus Christ. Our baptism is becoming a part of the beloved community that stands on the level plain with no one more important than the other, no one more worthy than another, no one any more a sinner than another. Our baptism is becoming a part of that beloved community and living as part of that community that includes all of God's creation.

The only way we can do this is by continual education and formation grounded in worship, prayer, community, and the unrelenting truth that Christ loves you eternally and calls you to love all, without exception, eternally.

There will be ample opportunities for worship, education, and formation this fall – take advantage of these.





"50 Shades"


